I will bring them to the next meeting for those who didn't see them at this meeting.

Kathylee did a lot of research to narrow down the options for medical alert systems. An attachment to this email shows several of those that might work for our members. Two of those she selected as samples are worn by some of our members: the Lively Mobile Plus and the Medical Guardian Smartwatch. They were given good reviews by those that wear them, so that might be a good place to start. The thing to remember when selecting a device is how you intend to use it, and the commitment to wearing the device. It does no good lying at home when you're out and about. Another thing to remember is that if you need fall-detect, a wristwatch device is not the first recommendation. Too much movement of the arm results in frequent false alarms. It's a good choice for active people who don't require fall alert. If anyone needs help deciding which device to get, or help filling out the medical information cards, please let me know.

TIPSFORCHOOSING A MEDICAL ALERT DEVICE

Determine if you need a landline or cellular system.

As the names imply, landlines plug into your phone jack, so if the device will be used only at home, this option should suffice. Much like a mobile phone, a cellular system connects to a cellular network and can be designed for mobile or at-home use but are generally less reliable than a landline system.

Do you need a monitored system?

A monitored system means the call button connects with someone at a 24/7 dispatch center. Other systems can call a person of your choosing like a family member or friend.

Do you need fall detection?

Some companies offer fall detection for an additional fee. If this is a feature you need, many systems provide it.

Beware of complicated pricing plans and hidden fees.

Companies will sometimes add these to 'trick' consumers. Look for ones without extra fees related to equipment, installation, or activation.

Find out if your insurance or Medicare will cover your system.

In some states Medicaid will cover at least part of the cost and your insurance company may offer discounts and waivers as well.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN A HOME MEDICAL ALERT COMPANY

- Transparency: Companies should be upfront about their pricing. Avoid companies with hidden fees or those who use misleading sales tactics.
- No Long Contracts: Some companies have contracts that last up to 3 years and breaking the contract can result in a steep fee. Make sure you can cancel your service at any time without paying a cancellation penalty.
- Customer Service: If a company is hard to get a hold of or not good at communicating, you may want to think twice about relying on its emergency services.
- Comfortable and Durable Devices: If you are purchasing a mobile device, bulky all-in-one units may not be comfortable and can make the user feel less
 inclined to actually wear the device. Make sure the device is comfortable to wear or carry around all day. You'll also want a device that can withstand normal
 wear-and-tear and is water resistant.
- Protection in the Shower: Bathrooms present a high-fall risk for many seniors due to the slick, hard surfaces and potential for water to create hazards. Look for waterproof pendants or other solutions that ensure you or your loved one will be protected in the bathroom.

NO MONTHLY FEE MEDICAL ALERT SYSTEMS

Medical alert systems are available with no monthly fees but should be carefully considered. Choosing the right one can be difficult. Some have only the basic features, and others will add bells and whistles. Basic devices will usually have a lower cost, but the quality of the device may not be sufficient under certain conditions. For example, devices with a low range between the alert button and the transmitter may have a lower price tag, but this benefit is at the expense of the device's range. This feature has life-saving implications, so it should be evaluated with caution.

No Monthly Fee Medical Alert Devices, Pros and Cons

There are different types of systems available, and this plays a role in the device's effectiveness. Potential customers should consider two major types of plans carefully before deciding which one is most appropriate.

Some of the most important features of no-monthly fee devices include the following:

- The range of the device is better, so the alerts can be sent even when the distance between the device and the alert button is longer.
- The range between the alert button and the device should be at least 600 feet. Devices with a lower range are not sufficient even for small apartments.
- The more expensive equipment also allows you to program more numbers into the device.
- You can control the routing of the alerts to your preferred numbers.
- The overall cost of the system is lower than plans that charge a monthly fee.
- There is a two-directional voice feature included.

Some of the drawbacks of no-monthly fee devices include the following:

- Wait times tend to increase during serious situations, which might become life-threatening in some cases.
- The number might not get picked up by family members if they are busy.
- Some people might be reluctant to use the system even in situations where it is completely justified.

Three No-Monthly Fee Companies

1. Geemarc Ampli600: This system allows the user up to six emergency numbers, and the device is fully portable. This allows the person to freely move around their home. Custom messages can be programmed into the wireless transmitter. A cancel button is conveniently located on the top of the device. There is an amplifier on the system, which is great for users who have difficulty hearing.

2. Lifelink: This system allows eight different emergency numbers, and it can be used in either the U.S. or in Canada. This system has an option that allows users to connect via Bluetooth, and this is an ideal option for people who don't want to use a landline. The attached pendant is fully waterproof, and this means it can be used in the shower.

3. LogicMark: This system is connected via landline, and the pendant is not waterproof. However, the company also offers two different systems. The first is called Freedom Alert, and the second is Guardian Alert. The user can program the order of the calls. This is great if the first call doesn't connect. There is another mode in the program that allows the calls to go to 911 if none of the emergency contacts respond.

Summary

The different providers also offer different types of payment plans, which can determine the total cost of the medical alert system. Most people are already familiar with medial alert systems that charge a monthly fee, for example. However, there is also the option of getting a medical alert system that does not require you to purchase a monthly subscription. This type of system only charges you for the original cost of the equipment.
